Costume College, 2006

Held in Van Nuys, California August 4 through 6, 2006 Reviewed by Diane Harris

We began our journey with 5 guildsters (Frances, Kathleen, Lyn, Tasha and me) at a very dark, early time on Thursday, August 3, in two cars that were fairly empty of luggage (more on that later). We prefer driving to flying because of our need to take sewing machines, costumes, etc. Airlines just do not have the same appreciation or possessive need to keep our equipment completely safe

and whole like we think they should. I mean, really, shouldn't they provide special seats for sewing machines and sergers?

We left early because we wanted to stop in Riverside, CA to visit a boot maker, Rennick's Western Boots - 9243 Magnolia Avenue, Riverside, CA (951-688-1897). We had information that he makes boots for any period to fit any foot – no small feat – and guarantees his work. Of course, we wanted to investigate. We were completely delighted – his work is very good – he takes a gazillion measurements of both feet - can even tell you where your feet ache - and has a great deal of variety in the style of even one period for boots. These are handmade boots, folks. If you watch Deadwood, those boots are mostly his. He is a true craftsman, having learned from his grandfather and father. Not many family businesses like this exist now. Four of us ordered boots – look for more information on this about the end of November – process is 10 to 12 weeks. I can't wait. We will post pictures when we all receive our boots.

We stopped next in the Artesia area to look at Sari material in the Indian District where Tasha found some stunning length of fabric. Some of the jewelry (although modern) was breathtaking. The colors were spectacular. Some of us purchased lengths of fabric for our Turkish costumes.

Finally, Costume College - Air-Tel Hotel in Van Nuys. For those of who have not attended a Costume College before, plan to attend next year. You will learn so much: period techniques, make corsets, making hats without hat blocks, who's who in researching and documenting your costume, dyeing straw braid, making gloves, men's clothes, etc., etc., etc. - a very intense combination of classes and panels on just costumes. This event is 3 days with tours to various places in Los Angeles, classes and panels from 9 to 5 each day, a Gala dinner and costume event, a Tea event and a wonderful spirit of meeting, connecting and sharing anything and everything Costume. You can dress in costume or not. You will meet amateur and professional designers who work everywhere from Disneyland to opera companies to theater companies to hobbyists, etc. Everyone that I met had something to share. Everyone (at any level) is there to learn something new. The energy that is present the entire weekend is remarkable.

Monday we traveled to the Fabric District – Downtown LA. This is blocks and blocks of warehouse type enclosures full of fabrics – OH THE FABRICS – velvets, silks, upholstery, cottons, rayons, linens, wool – it is very hard not to find the fabric you are seeking – sometimes extremely hard to make the choice of what you really want. Trims and sewing tools abound also. I suggest you visit Em-Be Fabric – 305 E. 9th Street (corner of 9th Street and Maple; 213-627-2202) first and last. The owner is Moez Banayan. He knows fabric. His prices are very fair. Moez was honored (1st honoree) at


the Gala event at Costume College this year for his contribution in fabric.

We also met up with Cat Devereaux, one of our newest members, where we had a lovely get together over Chinese Buffet. Cat has a wealth of history about International Costume Guild and costuming. She was recently awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award. Congratulations!

If you want to attend next year, just google in Costume College. Buy your membership now. The maximum number of attendees is only 300. This event was closed in December 2005, a full 9 months before the event in 2006. Are you getting a sense of urgency yet? Membership is \$75.00 for ICG members until August 28, 2006. After that, it goes up. Get in now. You won't regret it. After you register, drop us a line so we know who to expect next year.



While at Costume College, I toured the costume department of the LA Opera Company, which is located in a separate building from the opera house. I found the tour to be quite interesting since we had a personal tour of the building by Theresa, the Head Tailor of Men's Suits. She has a masters college degree in Theatrical Arts and was very kind to allow us to inspect the costumes firsthand.

<u>Cabela's</u> 9380 West Glendale Avenue, Glendale, Arizona reviewed by Randall Whitlock

The new Cabela's store received an enormous amount of attention when it opened in late July. Folks around my

office were talking about it who have no other interest in outdoor sports. I tried to visit on grand opening weekend, but couldn't get near the place. Teams of parking guys were waving drivers away from the completely full lot and directing them to park at the new football stadium on the other side of Glendale Avenue. There were even signs warning about the traffic congestion posted on the 101 freeway. A week later, I managed to sneak in on my lunch break

I had been eagerly awaiting the store opening since it was announced last year. My family has received the Cabela's mail order catalog for nearly thirty years and half of my work clothes were bought from Cabela's by mail or from their many storefronts in Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Cabela's is an outdoor sports store with a wide selection of camping, hiking, fishing, boating, hunting, archery, and outdoor cooking equipment, along with the clothes and boots to go with these activities. I wonder if Arizona has enough wilderness left to actually use all this stuff? Prices run a bit higher than Sportsman's Warehouse or the dearly departed Popular Outdoors. I'm hoping for frequent sales.

Their house is a museum when people come to see 'em. They really are a scre-am, the Cabela's family.

The song quote is no accident. You'll see more stuffed dead critters staring down at you than in the Addams parlor. Whole rooms are dedicated to taxidermy displays. Well enough done, but not exactly my thing.

I much better enjoyed the walk-through aquarium, which features specimens of Arizona's game fish (trout, bass, bluegills) and the endangered chubs and suckers of the Colorado River drainage. Cabela's must have an arrangement with the Arizona Game & Fish Department to display these rare fishes.

Other entertainments in the store include two laser-based shooting galleries, an archery range, and a cafeteria on the upper deck. The elevators and restrooms are concealed in a faux sandstone cliff with (you guessed it) stuffed mountain goats.

In short, I was in redneck high hog heaven and will return to the store frequently, once the hype dies down.

What's in it for the costume? Maybe you're planning a Red Green costume? (Don't laugh, an amiable young lady was wearing a fine Possum Lodge uniform at Costume-Con 24 this spring.)

As noted in my Sportsman's Warehouse review last year, many of our costumes are worn at SCA, SASS and other events which call for good camping gear. The many colorful feathers and beads in the fly-tying department have their uses in the decorative arts.

The Complete Fashion Sourcebook by John Peacock

This book covers 1920 through 1989. It gives a flavor of what fashion was like for each year including accessories. If you are trying to find the silhouette and flavor of an era this is an excellent starting point, particularly when you are trying to describe the feel of a period to someone who has not researched that period. I addition to the sketches there are descriptions of the garments including fabric and color. Major designers for each decade are also listed in the back of the book.

This is one of John Peacock's wonderful flavor/feel of an era book; it gives a good overview of the years covered with sketches, descriptions, and references. It is not an in-depth view of any one-year or decade, but it is not meant to be.
