### Domino Delivered in Less Than Thirty Minutes

Old time radio lore has it that the Lone Ranger made his famous mask from the leather vest of his slain brother after his posse was bushwhacked by the Cavendish gang. My situation was not so grave, but I needed a mask in a hurry for a Halloween party.

I wanted a mask that fit, with the eyeholes positioned just right. To accomplish this, I molded a sheet of aluminum foil around my face. Blindfolded by the foil, I traced my eye sockets and the arch of my nose with a soft marker pen. I also marked how high up my forehead, around to the sides, and down on my cheekbones I wanted the finished mask to reach. I took off the foil form and transferred these marked lines to folded paper by piercing the foil with a pin.

I played connect-the-dots on the paper and smoothed out the curves, yielding the mask pattern seen at lower right. This style of mask is called a "Domino." It's a favorite of superheroes, as well as lords and ladies at carnival. There's a domino in the middle of the Southwest Costumers Guild logo.



I traced the pattern with marking pen onto some scrap felt I had laying around the sewing table. I extended the corners of the pattern for ties. The theme of the party was "Davy Jones' Crew" (From Pirates of the Caribbean, not the Monkees), So I added some felt barbels to suggest a lobster man. I made a lobster claw glove for the costume too, but that's another story.

### **Randall's Electric Camp Light: The Next Phase**



A couple of issues back, I showed off the electric camp lamps I had built for my renfaire pavilion. Jean recently gifted me with some metal and glass candle lanterns. Converting these to sneaky electric lights proved surprisingly easy. I purchased an electric lamp socket and a "swag lamp" kit at Home Depot. The kit came with 20 feet of electric cord (with a plug and inline switch already installed), 20 feet of chain suitable for disguising the cord, a new threaded loop for the top of the lamp, and enough nipple\* to connect things together.

I applied some frosting spray to the glass windows so that the new socket and CF bulb wouldn't be obvious. I ground the original wire loop off the top of the lantern and drilled a hole through the top. The nipple supports the new loop and the lamp socket through the hole. The result is a lamp post suitable for meeting Mr. Tumnis in the forests of Narnia.



Powered by my treasure chest battery box and an inverter, the lamp is bright enough to let shoppers compare colors in my costume pavilion. It's all ready for the late hours at Phoenix Faerie Festival. I considered making it into a pixie bug zapper, but thought better of it.

\* Nipple is that hollow threaded rod used in lamp making. Sometimes I think those electricians had weaning issues.
