Freeway Remembered

Your editor's senior cat Freeway passed away on December 23, 2008 at the ripe old age of 16½ due to complications from injuries. Well known to the guildsters, Freeway was one eccentric feline, with enough personality for any three other cats. As a prime example, take a look at this piece I wrote back in 1999:

Cat Burglar

A True Tale of Tawny Terror by Randall Whitlock

Early last summer, empty cigarette packages began to appear in my front yard. Few at first, the packages soon arrived more frequently and in greater numbers, with as many as six per night. At first I thought they had been casually tossed into the yard by passers-by. The litterbug, however, was too consistent. The packs were always the same brand and they always showed up in the

- I got up at irregular intervals to walk around the lawn, wielding a baseball bat. The packs still appeared.

I kept this up for over two months and never saw the intruder, though I learned his visits always came between four and six AM. Loss of sleep was driving me bananas, though I had enough cigarette packages to "earn valuable prizes."



Finally, I broke down and bought a clearance model camcorder. I pointed it out the front window (concealed it under an old t-shirt), ran a cable to my VCR, and popped in an eight-hour tape.

On the third night of surveillance I knew I had him. A cigarette package had been deposited on the front porch, right below the hidden camera. I played back the tape on fast forward. The front gate had not been opened and nobody had climbed the fence!

I played the tape again. This time I caught a flash of motion. I rewound and played the sequence again at normal speed. It appeared first in the distance, bounding across the street. It was Freeway, my venerable silver tabby tom cat, with a cigarette package in his mouth! He leapt the fence and

padded toward the camera with his prize. I had a genuine cat burglar!


