Prom the 1890s to 1914, the sinuous forms and flowing lines of nature were a primary source for Nouveau artists who sought to break away from past styles. Paris was an epicenter of this movement that influenced architecture, applied arts and graphic design. Dennita Sewell, Curator of Fashion Design with Helen Nosova, Curatorial Assistant, Deborah Missel, ASU Art History major and fashion intern and Caesar Chaves, Creative Director, Heard Museum will lead a discussion with examples of original fashion designs and magazines from this period drawn from the Museum's collections about this movement which continues to influence high fashion and graphic design today.




As someone who occasionally does classes / demos, I know how nice it is to feel that someone really got something out of it. My family has lately.

Laurie Seeks Volunteer Presenters for Phoenix College Costume Course.

I'm Laurie Taylor, part-time teacher at Phoenix College. I'm mostly a very quiet, background member of this group. I had always intended to introduce myself in person at a guild event, but so far that's still on my to-do list. I've taught at PC for almost 15 years, and have filled in some additional time with costuming for Ballet Arizona and Childsplay Theatre. I just got back yesterday (August 3) from Costume College in Van Nuys, CA. Next year I have to pick between USITT, Costume Symposium, Costume College, and CSA...it's going to be a busy year, but I do love going to costume events. My family also joined SCA last year, but with crazy schedules we haven't made it to any SCA events either.

Now, I'm getting ready to teach a new class at PC. Our Costume Construction class is offered in the upcoming fall scheduler. The class is a lab class in which each student will be building a costume piece of their own choosing. It may be fantasy, theatrical, historical, or whatever suits the students' individual interests. It may help to say that the class is focused as listed below, but with no area emphasized more than any other.

Theatre costume

Period/Historical costume

Fantasy/Sci-fi costume

Dance costume – Ballet

- Other

Film/Movie costume – discussion only (most likely)

Other as students request

To give the students exposure to more ideas about costuming, especially beyond my own experience, I'd like to bring in guest speakers several times over the semester. Anyone who has done any costuming would be welcome. You need not be costuming professionally to have interesting experiences and insights to share. Guests could have 30-60 minutes in which to discuss or show their costumes, or demonstrate some technique that they've found useful.

To that end, for example, I am having the former Costume Director of BAZ come in to talk about building ballet costumes. She'll talk about the unique aspects of fitting dancers for the extremes of movement that they perform. She'll also discuss construction techniques for making costumes sturdy enough to take the abuse of repeated use.

Could you answer any of these questions for students?

How did you choose to balance between period correct and practical for your particular end use?
How deeply did you get into traditional techniques? Have you done a costume completely by hand? If so, why? Can you show that costume?

If you do steampunk, which is completely outside of my range, could you explain it and show your costumes?

Would you be willing to come to our classroom and share some of your costuming experiences?
If so, consider this an invitation!

Class begins September 3, one week after the regular start of the semester.

For my part in the class, in addition to teaching my students to build their chosen projects, I'm going to demonstrate techniques on pieces that I am building to wear in the History of Fashion class. My goal is to be able to dress appropriately for each week's lecture. This could take a few years, but it will be fun. I think I'll pass on dressing for the Egyptian lecture, hehehe, but the rest will be fun.

Having been led to a chair, I talked with a woman who had been before me in line; her items were Paramount movie collectibles, including a 3-D poster for "2001" and a record of an interview with Arthur Clarke. I waited and waited. No one knew where I was except the appraiser. Cell phones were verboten - interference with the recording equipment. Finally the producer showed up. Neither I nor the lady next to me were being filmed. However, it turns out that the artist was a major costume designer, primarily for ballets.
